

President's Comments

Our November neighborhood meeting included Councilman Chuck Grayeb and Mike Rogers, Director of Public Works for the City of Peoria. As most of you know, the main topic of discussion was repairing the water main under the intersection of Main St. and University. Earlier this summer a water main broke at the Main and University intersection causing major damage from the water leak (also causing colossal cut-through and colossal traffic jams in our neighborhood). Illinois American Water put a temporary patch on this leak. A permanent fix is in store and would include closing this intersection and doing a complete overhaul of this intersection. Both the city and Illinois American water want this project done very soon. Remember, there is only a temporary patch on this water main. The city's plans are to have all the design and construction finished by mid-May, 2014.

The good news here is that this construction process is an opportunity to "modernize" the city's busiest intersection. A re-design will include providing more efficient vehicle and pedestrian traffic, wider sidewalks, ADA compliant, etc. "I think we have a great opportunity to do something aesthetically pleasing, plus be a lot safer for pedestrians and bicyclist," states Rogers. This is where YOU! An Uplands Resident can help. The city's engineers are open for suggestions from the residents living adjacent to this intersection. What would you like to see done at this intersection? How would you design this area? Perhaps you have lived in other parts of the country where you observed intersections that moved a lot of vehicle and pedestrians efficiently. Your suggestions are encouraged. Public Works Director Mike Rogers states, "We want to get as much information as we can about the desires of the stakeholders in the area."

The bad news here is the amount of cut through traffic throughout the Uplands that this construction project will generate. Remember, the Main St./University intersection is the busiest in the entire city. During the construction process, this large amount of traffic has to be rerouted and has to go somewhere. At the neighborhood meeting, Mr. Rogers informed us that the city will try to "educate" the general public to take alternate routes prior to the start of the construction. Local media outlets along with signage will help with this process. The engineers estimate a total shut-down of the intersection for about 2-3 weeks. Prior to this shut-down, the intersection will be open, however with reduced lanes. Despite trying to educate (or re-educate) the general public on taking alternate routes, one should be prepared for cutthrough traffic starting in the early spring.

There should be another public meeting on this topic sometime in the month of January or February. I'll keep everyone informed. If you have any thoughts, ideas or suggestions concerning the re-design of the Main/ University intersection, please contact:

Meeting Minutes 11/14/13

Called to order at 7:03

Councilman Chuck Grayeb gave an overview of what we can expect from the improvements to the intersection at Main and University. At this point we know that the city will need to close the intersection for some period of time to redo the intersection. They are exploring ideas to keep the traffic going through our neighborhood controlled, and are asking for more input as to what we are interested in having them do to help us with this situation.

Director Mike Rogers, of the Peoria Public Works arrived and began speaking about the options available for the intersection work. First, he wanted to emphasize that they will do what is needed, within reason, to assure no damage or harm to the neighborhoods during construction.

-Many different ideas were considered for the intersection, however, the most likely at this point is a raised intersection with ADA compliance and an all stop pedestrian crossing. It should also include storm water management and new greenery/trees to the area.

-We as a neighborhood need to keep involved as far as alternate routes and traffic calming methods, the process is fluid and it's essential that we keep an open mind.

-It is possible that University between Columbia Terrace and Main will be reduced to 3 lanes with more sidewalk space and on street parking, to create a more walkable neighborhood.

-A key part of the traffic calming will be to advertise that the intersection will be closed, and to try alternate freeway routes. For example taking the Sterling exit to Farmington to get to

Bradley, or routing traffic that is heading downtown to the appropriate exits. Other routes are being planned to help reduce cut through traffic as much as possible.

-Director Rogers expressed an interest in meeting again in January to firm up plans.

-It is expected the work will be done prior to May.

Tax Exemptions

There are several tax exemptions available to homeowners in the City of Peoria, some automatic, some you need to apply for, and some for age 65 and older. For more information, see the Tax Exemption Brochure on the City Assessor's website or contact the Assessor's office at 494-8180.

- Owner occupied homes receive an automatic reduction of \$5,000 in the assessed valuation. Check your property tax bill to make sure you see "owner occupied exemption – 6,000." If your home was previously a rental, you may need to contact the assessor's office to alert them of the change.
- If you make an improvement to your home that requires a building permit, the assessed value of your home will not increase for four years. This is an automatic deferral, upon issue of the building permit. To see what improvements require a building permit, see the City Inspections web page.
- If you are 65 or older, live in your home, and have an income of \$45,000 or less, you may apply for a tax freeze. You must apply each year.
- If you are 65 or older, you may apply for a \$4,000 reduction of your home's assessed value (no income requirement).

Did You Know?



CAPTAIN HENRY DETWEILLER (continued from November Uplander)

From 1850 to 1860, the river business between the North and South was immense. During these years, Mr. Detweiller acted in the different capacities of Pilot and Captain, on a number of boats upon the Illinois and Mississippi Rivers. In 1856,

he became part owner of the Steamer "Movastar," and in 1857, became the sole owner of the Steamer "Minnesota." During his last years upon the river, he frequently had Abraham Lincoln as a passenger, and came to know him well.

In 1862, he offered his services to the Government, and was sworn into the service, at St. Louis, and assigned to the command of the United States Steamer "Jenny Lind," and was ordered to Cairo, to await the arrival of the fleet with General Pope's troops aboard from Island No. 10. The "Jenny Lind" was detailed as dispatch boat to the flag-ship accompanying the fleet up the Tennessee River to Pittsburg landing. Later on he was with the fleet at Memphis. In 1863, Captain Detweiller was transferred to the U. S. Steamer Yankee, of which he had charge until the close of the war and was attached to the fleet at the fall of Vicksburg.

While managing the Government transports, he performed a very important and often hazardous service. So great was the danger to which his boat was exposed during these perilous years, that Captain Detweiller was compelled to adopt various schemes to evade the enemy. His boat was sometimes disguised as a gun-boat. The Yankee was never seriously injured, although often fired upon. The last important service of his boat was to take a cargo of horses, mules and stores valued at \$250,000 from St. Louis to New Orleans. The boat was fired upon, but the cargo was at length safely delivered in New Orleans.

After the war, Captain Detweiller was in charge of the Steamer "Beaver" until he abandoned the river, in 1874, to give his attention exclusively to the ice business, in which he had engaged, establishing it, in 1870, in partnership with N. L. Woodruff. In December, 1876, he severed his connection with Mr. Woodruff, and has conducted the business, either in his own name or under the name of the Detweiller Ice Company ever since.

He married Magdalena Bachman on November 5, 1848, at the home of his sister, in Woodford County, Illinois. Mrs. Detweiller was also a native of France. Seven children were born to them, three of whom are still living: Thomas H., Amelia M. and Matilda E. Detweiller. Mrs. Detweiller died December 10, 1888. Her death was a severe blow to her husband, as she had been in all respects. a helpmate. She was in her home, not only a devoted wife and mother, but a useful member of society, kindly, charitable and helpful to all who were in trouble or want. She was active in charitable work; connected with the Women's Christian Home Mission and with the Women's Relief Corps, and did her part in society and in the community.

Captain Detweiller's life has been a laborious one and beset with quite as many of the ordinary trials of life as fall to the lot of most men; yet through it all he has borne himself honorably and with characteristic geniality; never has allowed himself to be despondent, gloomy or hopeless, but in adversity, as well as prosperity, has maintained the same genial, pleasant, kindly character, endearing him to all with whom he has come in contact. As an evidence of the confidence of his fellow-citizens in his integrity, he was elected six times to the office of City Treasurer, without his seeking, and really against his personal desire.

He is a member of the Odd Fellows, and a charter member of Bryner Post 67, G. A. R., and was, for thirteen years. President of the Old Settlers' Association of Peoria.

He cast his first vote for General Taylor for President in 1848, and, since the organization of the Republican party, has been an ardent, earnest worker in that party, believing thoroughly in its principles.

During his residence of sixty-five years, he has seen the village of Peoria develop into a beautiful city of over 65,000 inhabitants, and he has, during all these years, contributed his full part to the growth of the city. It may be said of him, as of very few men, that he is not known to have an enemy in the city of Peoria or anyone who entertains aught but the kindliest sentiments towards him. This has resulted from his genial, kindly disposition, and his efforts to help rather than mar the fortunes of any man or woman. If there were more like him, it would be better for the community, for the city, for the State.

He is a man of decided character, strong convictions, tout willing that other men shall enjoy the same right and freedom of thought and act which he claims for himself. The thought of entertaining malice never has entered his mind. He has never known what jealousy is over the prosperity of others, and it is as much his delight to see his friends, neighbors and acquaintances prosper as it is to prosper himself. Such evenly balanced characters are rare: and when we see them, we cannot refrain from expressing our appreciation of them and our commendation of the men or women who bear them.
